# WHAT KEEPS US GOING

Dear Supporter,

Every morning, all of us wake up and make a decision. Most days, we probably don't even know we're making it. But in the face of big and small challenges, from the deeply personal to the greatest global crises, we all have to decide. Will we throw our hands up and say it's all too much? Or will we live our lives in a way that builds a better future?

In a year that often saw the forces of division try to tear us apart, the Clinton Foundation continued our work and advanced our core values of partnership, progress, and putting people first.

Throughout the year, we experienced firsthand how our programs and partners are making a difference — each providing powerful examples of how solutions to the world's most pressing challenges are within our reach.

■ At the **2023 CLINTON GLOBAL INITIATIVE (CGI) ANNUAL MEETING**, we brought together more than 2,000 leaders to explore what it takes to keep going in the face of the extraordinary challenges we face today. We heard stories and solutions from those who are on the frontlines of leading change in communities around the world — including remarkable moments with His Holiness Pope Francis, Ukraine First Lady Olena Zelenska, Reverend William J. Barber, Ai Wei Wei, Michael J. Fox, and many more. We also saw our community continue to answer the call to drive progress, launching 160 new CGI Commitments to Action — new, specific, and measurable plans that address global challenges — on a wide range of issues, including a dedicated CGI Action Network on the humanitarian response in Ukraine and a new focus on projects that will advance equal rights and opportunities for women and girls worldwide. We also traveled around the globe to meet with CGI's growing 'community of doers,' spanning five continents in five weeks to engage even more leaders on the front lines of the issues that matter to all of us. And, through a partnership with Vanderbilt University, we heard directly from hundreds of student leaders who are already turning their ideas into action for meaningful change on their campuses and in their communities.

## A LETTER FROM PRESIDENT CLINTON, SECRETARY CLINTON, AND CHELSEA CLINTON

■ **TOO SMALL TO FAIL** continued its work around early childhood development — expanding successful community efforts into statewide programs in California and Pennsylvania, and kicking off a new exploration of the unique role we as an organization can play in advancing solutions that prioritize children’s health in the face of climate change.

■ From Little Rock to Las Vegas, the **CGI OVERDOSE RESPONSE NETWORK** continued its work to combat overdose deaths across America — distributing free naloxone, conducting trainings on how it’s administered, and cultivating a powerful sense of community among those committed to saving lives and supporting those who need help. For National Recovery Month in September, the team organized a bus tour of 48 stops across Georgia aimed at celebrating long-term recovery and engaging leaders across the state in our work.

■ Through the **CLINTON PRESIDENTIAL CENTER** and our **PROJECT42 INITIATIVE**, we also spent the year marking important moments during the Clinton administration that continue to make a meaningful difference for millions of people. In April, we marked the 25th anniversary of the historic Good Friday Agreement, which ended decades of sectarian violence

in Northern Ireland and established a framework for shared government. In addition, two major programs — the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and AmeriCorps — turned 30 this year. Since they were established, FMLA has been used more than 400 million times, and more than 1.2 million volunteers have served their communities through AmeriCorps. Behind each of these numbers are stories about real people benefiting from common sense policy solutions.

■ Building upon the momentum of the “Women’s Voices, Women’s Votes, Women’s Rights” summit at the Clinton Presidential Center, we expanded the work of the **HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON LEADERSHIP PROJECT**. Milestones included traveling to the salt pans of Gujarat, India, to see firsthand how extreme heat affects women workers. And, after announcing a specialized focus on issues of women’s equality through CGI, attending the COP28 climate conference where we prioritized issues at the center of climate change, public health, and women’s equality.

And initiatives that were started through the Foundation — like the Clinton Health Access Initiative and Clinton Development Initiative — continue to grow their impact as independent but affiliated organizations.

■ More than 20 years ago, the Clinton Foundation launched the Clinton HIV/AIDS Initiative, now known as the **CLINTON HEALTH ACCESS INITIATIVE (CHAI)**. The goal was to help save the lives of people living with HIV/AIDS in low- and middle-income countries by dramatically scaling up access to antiretroviral treatment — a tremendous feat for a challenge many thought would be impossible to solve. Today, 21 million people living with HIV now receive the treatment they need to make the disease a chronic illness rather than a death sentence thanks to CHAI's pioneering work negotiating price reductions and generic licenses, as well as critical efforts from partners like the Global Fund, PEPFAR, and Unitaid. And, it's not only in antiretrovirals, as CHAI has negotiated more than 140 agreements for expanded prevention, diagnostic, and treatment efforts for tuberculosis, malaria, early childhood malnutrition, and more.

■ At the end of 2023, the **CLINTON DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE** transitioned into an independent, community-led, and locally based organization called Community Agribusiness Partners. What began in 2006 with the belief that farmers could better support themselves, their families, and their communities if they had the right information, tools, and connections grew to a program that supported 200,000 farmers over nearly two decades. Now as an independent, community-led network, Community Agribusiness Partners is poised to expand this impact.

Additionally, the **ALLIANCE FOR A HEALTHIER GENERATION**, founded as a partnership between the Clinton Foundation and the American Heart Association, is transforming the everyday places children spend their time into healthier environments that can help set them up for success. Healthier Generation has helped thousands of schools and youth-serving organizations ensure that their policies and practices support kids to eat better and move more. To date, their work has affected more than 31.2 million children in 56,000 U.S. schools, districts, and out-of-school time sites. These children are benefiting from better health-promoting practices, including increased access to nutritious foods, high-quality physical activity, and tobacco-free environments.

The Clinton Foundation's work shows us that all over the world, countless people are still choosing hope. Despite the odds, they keep going. If we join them, we can beat the odds and build a stronger, healthier, more equitable future.

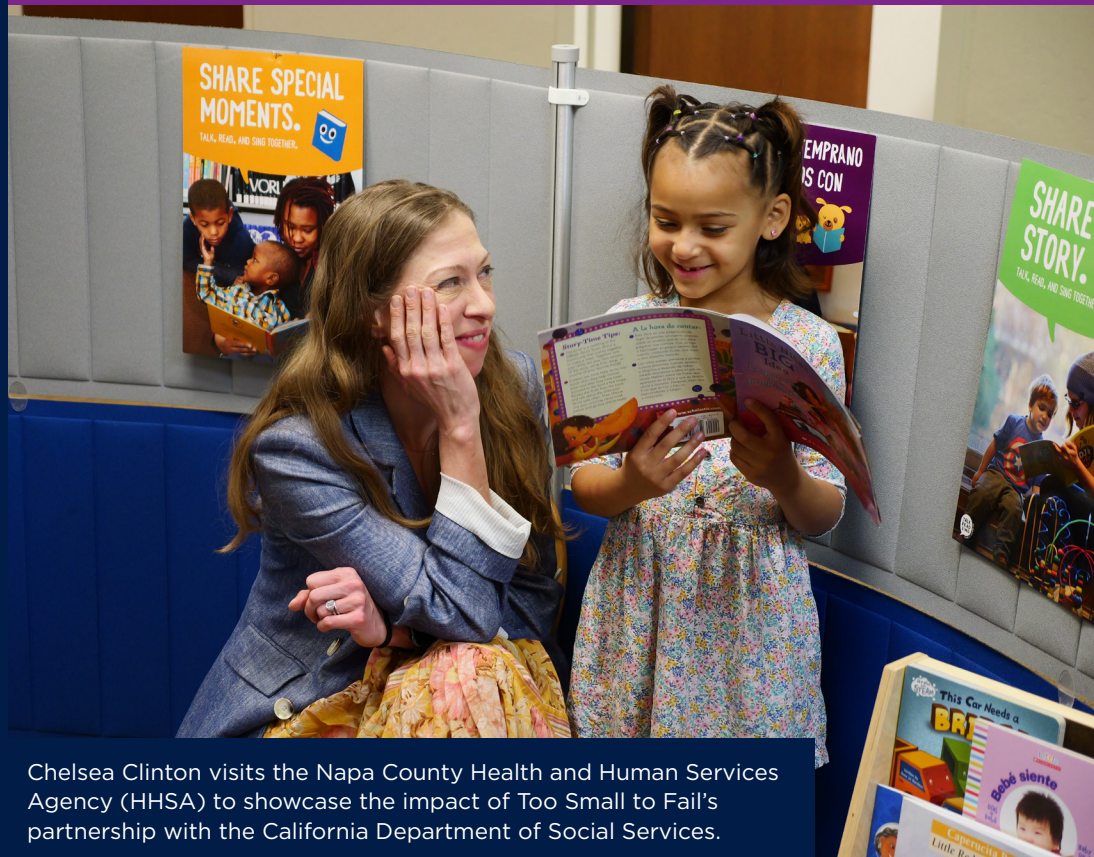

# TOO SMALL TO FAIL

Too Small to Fail surrounds families with early language and learning opportunities and supports parents and caregivers with resources to talk, read, and sing with young children from birth to help prepare them for success in kindergarten and beyond. In 2023, Too Small to Fail scaled its early literacy work through states across the country — building on its state campaign in Michigan and piloting new initiatives in California and Indiana. Recognizing the significant impacts that climate change has on young children’s health and brain development, Too Small to Fail also launched new initiatives to educate media, corporate, and philanthropic leaders on this issue.

## TOO SMALL TO FAIL

■ **OUR KIDS AND OUR PLANET:** Too Small to Fail hosted a cross-sector convening with Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton and Chelsea Clinton focused on the impacts of climate change on children's healthy development and solutions for U.S. families.

■ **NEW PARTNERSHIPS:** What do philanthropy, early childhood development, and Hollywood have in common? The Rockefeller Foundation announced that Too Small to Fail is among the first round of grantees for its climate strategy and will develop a framework for Hollywood writers, producers, and executives on how to incorporate messaging about the impact of climate change on young children's healthy development into storylines and popular culture.

■ **CALIFORNIA DREAMIN':** Chelsea Clinton traveled to Napa Valley, CA to meet with partners leading an initiative with Too Small to Fail. Together with the California Department of Social Services and county human service agencies, the partnership aims to transform the waiting rooms of California social service offices into engaging, family-friendly environments that promote talking, reading, and singing among children and caregivers.

## LOOKING AHEAD

Too Small to Fail has brought its “Talking is Teaching” campaign to six rural counties in Indiana with tools, resources, and strategies that support early brain and language development, with the potential of expanding to all of Indiana's 92 counties.

Too Small to Fail will also expand its current efforts in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh to build a statewide campaign in Pennsylvania by engaging multi-sector partners to reach families with 250 activations by 2026.

In addition, Too Small to Fail is beginning the second year of its Family Advisory Council, with the goal of centering diverse parent and caregiver voices in the program's initiatives, content, and resources. Over the next year, Council members will advise on Too Small to Fail's current and future strategies to support parents and caregivers across the country.

# CLINTON GLOBAL INITIATIVE

In 2023, the Clinton Global Initiative (CGI) focused on what it means to “keep going” — to maintain and advance progress in spite of the difficulties that arise. From our “Road to September” year-round programming to our Annual Meeting in New York City and a trip to COP28 in Dubai to drive action on the impacts of climate change and health — our “community of doers” are demonstrating what’s possible in addressing the world’s most pressing challenges.



The CGI 2023 Annual Meeting brought thousands of global leaders together to tackle pressing challenges and launch Commitments to Action — new, specific, measurable projects and programs that address **climate resilience, economic inclusion, health equity, humanitarian response, women and girls’ equality**, and more.

■ **TOP MOMENTS AT CGI 2023:** Watch special moments from CGI 2023 featuring His Holiness Pope Francis, Ukrainian First Lady Olena Zelenska, Michael J. Fox, Ai Weiwei, Eddie Ndopu, Padma Lakshmi, and so many more.

■ **ROAD TO SEPTEMBER:** Our team spent the year traveling across the globe preparing for the CGI 2023 Annual Meeting in September — including stops in Bulgaria, Morocco, and Colombia to discuss solutions at the intersection of food security, climate, and gender equity; Nevada and Georgia to elevate efforts to end our national overdose crisis; and across New York City to emphasize voices leading the way on maternal health, equality for women and girls, and much more.

■ **EMERGING LEADERS:** CGI University is a community of students taking action on challenges facing college campuses, communities, and the world. Since 2007, more than 12,000 students have participated. In 2023, CGI University convened hundreds of students at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, TN; provided year-round programming inspiring student action through an online curriculum; and launched the CGI Fellowship program.

**2023 IMPACT**

At the CGI 2023 Annual Meeting, world leaders launched more than 160 new Commitments to Action to drive progress on climate change, the humanitarian response in Ukraine, the rights of women and girls, global food insecurity, the care economy, the freedom of the press, and much more. When fully funded and implemented, these commitments will have a positive impact on the lives of more than 285 million people.

■ **PREVENTING OVERDOSES, SAVING LIVES:** Through the Overdose Response Network, CGI works with partners to expand free access to lifesaving naloxone and supports partners — including faith leaders, community-based organizations, and advocates — who are uniquely positioned to reduce stigma in their communities. For National Recovery Month in September, the CGI Overdose Response Network worked with partners to launch the Mobilize Recovery Across Georgia Bus Tour to celebrate recovery, educate individuals on harm reduction resources, and demonstrate to communities across Georgia that “recovery is real.”

■ **CGI AT COP28:** By 2050, climate change is likely to cause an additional 14.5 million deaths and \$12.5 trillion in economic losses worldwide. In December, Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton, Chelsea Clinton, and the CGI team participated in COP28, leading conversations and advancing the work of CGI partners at the intersection of climate, health, and gender equity.

■ **CONTINUED ACTION IN UKRAINE:** In the face of the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine, CGI launched the Ukraine Action Network to support CGI partners in rapidly coordinating and amplifying response and assistance endeavors on the ground; maintaining sustained international attention; and directing vital resources for today and long-term commitments to support Ukraine’s post-war reconstruction — all while adapting to the evolving needs of the Ukrainian people. At CGI 2023, President Bill Clinton and Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton awarded First Lady Olena Zelenska with the Clinton Global Citizen Award and announced new projects to support the Ukrainian people.

■ **FULL PARTICIPATION OF WOMEN AND GIRLS:** At CGI 2023, Secretary Clinton and Chelsea Clinton announced the CGI Women and Girls’ Equality focus area aimed specifically and ambitiously at achieving full equality and equity for women and girls once and for all.

■ **AMERICORPS TURNS 30:** In October, the Clinton Center celebrated the 30th anniversary of AmeriCorps – the transformational national service program established by President Clinton that harnesses the energy and ingenuity of citizens to improve communities. To mark the occasion, President Clinton convened national service champions, leaders in the public and private sectors, and AmeriCorps alumni for “AmeriCorps: 30 Years Forward,” a summit exploring the impact of the program and ways to expand service opportunities and strengthen the AmeriCorps program for current and future generations.

■ **DOUBLING DOWN ON CIVIC ENGAGEMENT:** In 2023, the Clinton School of Public Service, the National Conference on Citizenship, and other partners produced the Arkansas Civic Health Index — a first-of-its-kind report detailing the conditions of civic engagement in Arkansas. The report indicated that Arkansas has the lowest voter registration and voter turnout in national elections of any state, and voter turnout has declined in the past two generations. The Clinton Center is committed to improving civic participation and education and will expand its Student Presidential Leaders Series program, grow its Arkansas Civic Education Institute, develop new opportunities to enhance civics education, and present public programs focused on the importance of civic engagement in preserving democracy.

■ **CONNECTING COLLABORATIVE LEADERS:** The Presidential Leadership Scholars (PLS) program – a nonpartisan partnership between the presidential centers of George W. Bush, William J. Clinton, George H.W. Bush, and Lyndon B. Johnson – invites a broad spectrum of established leaders to strengthen their impact through a more collaborative approach to leadership. In 2023, the eighth cohort joined a network of more than 475 Scholars who are applying lessons learned through PLS to make a difference. In January 2024, PLS announced its latest class of 60 scholars who will form the program’s ninth annual class.

### LOOKING AHEAD

In 2004, President Clinton welcomed the world to the Clinton Center for the first time, and in the 20 years since, more than five million people have visited. Throughout 2024, the Clinton Center will celebrate 20 years of milestones to mark the anniversary and explore how it can deepen its impact for the next 20 years.



## CLINTON PRESIDENTIAL CENTER

■ **MASTERING PUBLIC SERVICE:** The Clinton School of Public Service at the University of Arkansas offers the nation's first Master of Public Service, an action-oriented program focused on equipping students for the tough work of on-the-ground change. In 2023, Clinton School students helped launch a food prescription and delivery program for food-insecure seniors; developed a rural school district's first Pre-K program; and measured the impact of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization's Global Forum Against Racism and Discrimination.

■ **WORDS OF WISDOM:** The Clinton Center welcomes diverse thought leaders and experts through its dynamic public program series. In 2023, speakers reinforced the need for civility and civic engagement: President Clinton and former Maryland Governor Larry Hogan shared their insights about civility and the keys to bridging America's political divisions. Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton, Professor Robert Putnam, and Filmmakers Pete and Rebecca Davis shared why the fate of America depends on civic involvement.

■ **A MAJOR EXPANSION:** In August, the Clinton Center announced plans for a major expansion, with Studio Gang, the award-winning international architecture and urban design practice led by Jeanne Gang, to design the project. In this new space, the Clinton Center will bring people together to engage in critical conversations about the future of democracy and human rights while increasing the visibility of the ongoing work of the Clinton Foundation and modeling environmental stewardship. In 2024 and the coming years, the Clinton Center will work with partners and the community to design a transformational space for education, inspiration, and innovation.

# PROJECT 42

In 2023, Project 42 expanded its work to engage Clinton campaign and administration alumni and reach new audiences — applying the enduring lessons of President Bill Clinton’s lifetime of public service to the challenges of today; inspiring the next generation of leaders; and fostering a spirit of active citizenship and shared community.



## PROJECT 42

■ **THE BIG PICTURE:** Project 42 highlights the record of the Clinton administration and engages with alumni who served in the administration or on the Clinton-Gore campaigns.

■ **INAUGURATION NATION:** Project 42 and Clinton administration alumni marked the 30th anniversary of President Clinton's first inauguration — when the work of “Putting People First” officially began — by sharing reflections on what it meant to be part of the campaign, attend his inaugural speech, or work in the White House during the earliest days of the Clinton administration.

■ **25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE GOOD FRIDAY AGREEMENT:** President Clinton and Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton traveled to Northern Ireland to mark the 25th anniversary of the historic Good Friday Agreement. During their trip to the Queen's University Conference “Agreement 25,” they looked back on the Good Friday Agreement's lasting impact, the role of those who helped make it a reality, and how it fits into the context of today.

■ **30 YEARS OF SUPPORTING FAMILIES THROUGH FMLA:** No one should be forced to choose between the job they need and the families they love. President Clinton was invited to the White House with President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris to commemorate the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) — the first piece of legislation President Clinton signed into law — to discuss its impact for people across the country and explore what more must be done to support working families. Since President Clinton first signed FMLA into law in 1993, it has been used more than 300 million times.

■ **PEACE AND PROSPERITY IN ALBANIA:** Over U.S. Independence Day weekend, President Clinton visited Tirana, Albania, where Prime Minister Edi Rama bestowed him with Albania's Star of Gratitude for Public Achievements for service to and support of the region during the Clinton administration.

# A LETTER FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

March 1, 2024

Dear Reader,

Thank you for reading our annual report, for your engagement, and for your support.

In this report, we share aspects about the progress of our work over the past year, how President Clinton’s commitment to “putting people first” informs everything we do, and how we partner with individuals, organizations, and communities to advance solutions to our world’s most pressing challenges.

In 2023, we continued to expand the reach of the Clinton Global Initiative (CGI), in part by engaging additional partners and elevating more new solutions to a wide range of issues. Colleagues on our CGI team collaborated with hundreds of organizations and individuals to form new partnerships — leading to the launch of more than 160 new CGI Commitments to Action on climate change, health equity, economic inclusion, humanitarian response efforts in places like Ukraine and Sudan, equality for women and girls, and much more.

As in the past, our team designed this year’s Annual Meeting to prompt action; we also explored what it takes to ‘keep going’ in the face of adversity and learned again how CGI’s community epitomizes this ethos as participants shared updates on the progress of their work.

Colleagues in Little Rock at the Clinton Presidential Center (CPC) continued to provide educational and cultural programming — including a celebration of the 30th anniversary of the founding of AmeriCorps, through which more than one million volunteers have

served since its founding. Along with our Project 42 team, colleagues at the CPC also engaged old friends and new audiences around other experiences and lessons learned during the Clinton administration, such as commemorating the 25th anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement, which created a framework for peace in Northern Ireland. Through these and other efforts, we’re applying the enduring lessons of President Clinton’s lifetime of public service to the challenges of today.

This year, we also reached families across the country with the resources of Too Small to Fail — providing books, play spaces, and other ways to strengthen brain development for young children; supported efforts to end the overdose crisis in the United States through the Overdose Response Network; assisted student leaders through CGI University; and so much more. Additionally, the Clinton Development Initiative transitioned into an independent, community-led, and locally based network of organizations called Community Agribusiness Partners. This network will continue to promote economic growth and development by partnering with farmers in sub-Saharan Africa.
