Our Story

The Clinton Foundation is a nonpartisan nonprofit organization that develops leaders and accelerates solutions to the world's most pressing challenges. Under the leadership of President Clinton, Secretary Clinton, and Chelsea Clinton, our unique approach prioritizes putting people first, outcomes over ideology, and working together in service of a brighter future.

Flagship programs have made a measurable humanitarian impact:

CLINTON GLOBAL INITIATIVE (CGI): Transforming modern philanthropy with an unparalleled model for action. CGI was born from a simple but radical premise: the world didn't need another talk fest. By working to fill the needs facing civil society, CGI has proven the power of convening heads of state, CEOs, and grassroots implementers to tackle problems the world had given up on solving. At its first meeting in 2005, participants launched more than \$2.5B in commitments spanning renewable energy, microfinance, education, and public health. Over two decades, CGI has made a positive impact on more than 500 million lives worldwide by mobilizing 13,000 organizations to implement 4,300 projects.

CLINTON HEALTH ACCESS INITIATIVE (CHAI): Unlocking life-saving health care and medicine for 30 million people in the Global South. When CHAI launched in 2002, HIV treatment costs were up to \$10,000 per person annually in the United States, and fewer than 100,000 people in the Global South were receiving care. CHAI set a new standard by pioneering market-shaping strategies to expand global access to affordable HIV/AIDS, malaria, and tuberculosis medicines. By negotiating directly with manufacturers and shifting to high-volume, sustainable pricing models, CHAI helped reduce generic drug prices from \$600 to \$169 per person per year.

CLINTON PRESIDENTIAL CENTER AND LIBRARY: Equipping leaders with the skills to strengthen their communities and our democracy. Through powerful programming like the Presidential Leadership Scholars and world-class convenings, the Center has engaged more than 520,000 visitors, students, and educators and helped generate \$4.9B in economic impact in the Little Rock region.

Our Impact

What began in 2001 as a small startup with five staff members in Harlem and Little Rock has grown into a global organization reaching millions of people around the world.

In *Citizen*, President Clinton wrote that he created the Foundation to “maximize the benefits and minimize the burdens of our new century.” From early earthquake and AIDS relief efforts to sustained work in global health and economic opportunity, the Foundation was built to move quickly — bringing together unlikely partners and delivering measurable results.

As a programmatic foundation focused on the direct delivery of services, the impact is clear:
